Quick and Easy Roast Chicken

45 min Active: 5 min Yield: 4 Servings



Ingredients

- 1 whole roasting chicken (giblets removed)
- Kosher salt and freshly ground pepper
- 1 lemon, halved
- 1/4 cup extra-virgin olive oil
- 3 tablespoons granulated garlic
- 3 tablespoons oregano

Preheat the oven to 500 degrees F. Rinse the chicken and pat dry. Put lemon halves inside the bird. Season with olive oil all over, sprinkle with salt and pepper, & oregano, then place breast side up on a rimmed baking sheet. Roast 20 minutes, until skin starts to get brown and crusty in the high temperature oven. Once it is browned, cover the whole pan tightly with aluminum foil and turn oven down to 375 degrees. Continue to roast until the chicken is golden and cooked through, about 20 more minutes. Uncover the chicken and let it rest before serving. Pan drippings will make wonderful gravy or base for a soup with the leftover chicken. This is my no fail method for cooking a chicken and having the leftover for soup the next day. **ENJOY**

SPRING IS HERE AND SO ARE THE SKUNKS!! Protecting your yard



Habitat modification

Skunks are opportunists at heart they're mainly attracted to low-hanging fruit like garbage and pet food left out at night, as well as convenient denning sites, such as wood and rock piles, elevated sheds, openings under concrete slabs and porches and crawl spaces.

Preventive measures, such as removing attractants around houses, will decrease the likelihood of an unpleasant skunk encounter. This includes <u>securing trash</u>, covering window wells, feeding pets indoors, or if fed outdoors, removing food immediately after pets eat.

Skunks also dig for grubs in lawns when wet soil conditions push grubs close to the surface — their presence may be a sign of an overwatered lawn. Occasionally, however, a skunk may also wander into an open garage or shed, which is a compelling reason to secure all outbuildings.

Preventing denning (exclusion)

Exclusion techniques should be used proactively to prevent denning before an animal moves in. Any suspected skunk den should first be checked to determine if it has residents.

This may be done by loosely filling the hole (or holes) with soil, leaves, straw, crumpled paper or similar material. If a skunk is present, the animal will easily push their way out overnight and reopen the hole.

If the plug remains undisturbed for two or three nights, it is safe to assume that the hole is unoccupied and can be filled. In the winter, skunks may remain inactive for longer periods, so provide them with a bit more time to disturb the plug before blocking the den entrance. Permanently exclude skunks (and other den-seeking creatures) with an <u>L-shaped footer</u> of welded wire or similar barriers.

If a skunk is using the den, either harassment or eviction using a <u>one-way door system</u> is recommended. When evicting skunks, be sure that dependent young are not present. When in doubt, assume they are and use the door only after they start following their mother to forage. Leave the door in place from two or three nights to a week to be sure the skunk has left.

Harassment

When it is safe to displace skunks, mild harassment can be very effective. This can be as simple as loosely repacking the den hole with leaves or straw or other material to see if the skunk gets the message and moves elsewhere. If they require more persuading, adding light and noise to make an dark and quiet denning space unattractive may help as well. Make sure the skunk is not close by before setting up the disturbances.



REMINDERS OF OUR COMMUNITY GUIDELINES

If you are interested in selling your home, you need to notify the office at least 30 days prior to sale to let us know of your intent. The home will then need to be inspected to get an approval to sell through the park manager. This just makes sure basic safety features of the home are in place and working, smoke alarms, oil tanks, safety of steps and decks etc. Just call the office to set up an appointment for John to come out and look your home over.

You also can use the community staff to sell your home or hire an outside real estate agent to list your home. An important rule to let potential buyers to know right away. The home cannot be sold until the potential buyer is approved to live in our community. They must have an approved residency application to follow through with the purchase of the home.

On another note, we do ask to be notified before you get a dog, you must have park approval before obtaining a dog. There are breed restrictions (due to insurance purposes), spay and neutering is required, vaccinations and licensing are requirements as well.

As you may know the staff love dogs, and these rules are in place for the safety of the community and it's residents. I also want to thank residents who own a dog and are responsible owners who take care their dog by updating

their vaccinations and licensing.

The Girl Scout Cookie: A Delicious Tradition

This month, the 2.3 million Girl Scouts across the United States will begin taking orders for some 200 million boxes of Thin Mints, Tagalongs and more as they launch their annual Girl Scout cookie sale. A considerable source of funding for troop activities, the sales are also an important learning opportunity in the spirit of the Girl Scout organization, helping the girls develop valuable business and marketing skills.

On March 12, 1912, Juliette Gordon Low called together 18 girls in Savannah, Georgia, for the first meeting of the Girl Scouts. Low, who had always played sports and had an interest in the arts since she was a child, wanted to encourage girls to get out of the house and be active in order to promote physical and mental development. Girl Scouting took off and soon spread throughout the United States, with local troops taking part in service projects to finance their activities. In 1917, the Girl Scouts of Muskogee, Oklahoma, also known as the Mistletoe Troop, decided to sell cookies in a local high school cafeteria to raise money for their club, unofficially launching the tradition of Girl Scouts cookie sales.

In July 1922, Chicago's local Girl Scout director Florence E. Neil wrote an article for the organization's national magazine, The American Girl, in which she included a costefficient cookie recipe for girls to use for their baked goods sales. The ingredients for the recipe would cost 26 to 36 cents and would yield up to seven dozen cookies; the cookies could then be sold for 25 to 30 cents per dozen. Gradually these cookie sales evolved from girls baking in their kitchens at home to an enormous commercial enterprise. The organization licensed their first commercial baker in 1936 to accommodate the nationwide sale of Girl Scout cookies. By the end of the 1940s, the Girl Scouts were employing nearly 30 commercial bakers for their cookie sales, and by 1951 they offered three tasty options: Peanut Butter Sandwich (Do-si-dos), Shortbread (Trefoils) and Chocolate Mints, now called Thin Mints.

Today, Girl Scout cookie production is handled by just two bakers, ABC Bakers and Little Brownie Bakers, in order to maintain consistency. Each baker produces eight cookie varieties. The selection varies each year-for instance, in 2012 they introduced "Savannah Smiles" to honor the 100th anniversary of Low's first Girl Scout meeting-but they are always required but bake the original three flavors. Though the cookies themselves are the same around the country, their names-with the exception of Thin Mints-vary depending on which bakery they come from. So if you're looking for a tasty coconut-covered treat and your local troop gets its cookies from Little Brownie Bakers, you'll be snacking on a Samoa, but if they order their treats from ABC Bakers, you'll be enjoying a Caramel deLite. Though their names may get shaken up, they still represent the same hard work and tradition that enterprising young scouts have enjoyed for nearly a century.
