Residents are reminded that NO motorized equipment other than licensed vehicles are allowed on Community roads, with the exception of lawn mowers and approved golf carts, said driver must have a State issued drivers license. This includes but not limited to, ATV's, mini bikes, dirt bikes or any other motor driven equipment, other than lawn mowers/golf carts. If

When it comes to raking, keep the weight down on the leaf bags. We have to throw them at least 5 to 6 feet into the trucks. Bags that are overweight will be left behind, so if you can't lift them over your head, we can't throw them!

Any limbs or branches can be put at curbside for pick up. Feel free to sweep your drive into the street for the sweeper to pick up. No date as of yet for the street sweeper.

Please read: According to EPA and State Drinking Water program rules Friendly Village must conduct a lead service line inspection this year. All this entails is a brief visit to your home site and determined the type of water line hooked to the Communities water line under your home. You do not need to be at home for this inspection. When we start the inspection process you will be notified prior by email. If there is no email listed for you we will call or drop a note off at your home. After a long winter it is a good time to freshen things up with a thorough Spring cleaning.

Save time and money while being kind to the environment by making your own cleaners at home with ingredients you most likely already have in your cupboard.

Make sure to keep all home-made formulas well-labeled, and out of the reach of children.



<u>Mold and Mildew:</u> Use white vinegar or lemon juice full strength. Apply with a sponge or scrubby.

<u>Tub and Tile Cleaner:</u> For simple cleaning, rub in baking soda with a damp sponge and rinse with fresh water. For tougher jobs, wipe surfaces with vinegar first and follow with baking soda as a scouring powder. (Vinegar can break down tile grout, so use sparingly.)

Window Cleaner: Mix 2 teaspoons of white vinegar with 1 liter (qt) warm water. Use crumpled newspaper or cotton cloth to clean. Only use the black and white newspapers, not the colored ones. Don't clean windows if the sun is on them, because if they are warm, streaks will show on drying. Be sure to follow the recipe, because using too strong a solution of vinegar will etch the glass and eventually cloud it.

<u>Chopping block cleaner:</u> Rub a slice of lemon across a chopping block to disinfect the surface. For tougher stains, squeeze some of the lemon juice onto the spot and let sit for 10 minutes, then wipe.

<u>Coffee and tea stains:</u> Stains in cups can be removed by applying vinegar to a sponge and wiping. To clean a teakettle or coffee maker, add 2 cups water and 1/4 cup vinegar; bring to a boil. Let cool, wipe with a clean cloth and rinse thoroughly with water.

Deodorize:


- Plastic food storage containers soak overnight in warm water and baking soda
- In-sink garbage disposal units grind up lemon or orange peel in the unit
- Carpets sprinkle baking soda several hours before vacuuming
- Garage, basements set a sliced onion on a plate in center of room for 12 24 hours

<u>All-Purpose Cleaner:</u> Mix 1/2 cup vinegar and 1/4 cup baking soda (or 2 teaspoons borax) into 1/2 gallon (2 liters) water. Store and keep. Use for removal of water deposit stains on shower stall panels, bathroom chrome fixtures, windows, bathroom mirrors, etc.


Arbor Day, April 28th, came about as an idea from a Nebraskan journalist and politician, Julius Sterling Morton, who strived to im-



prove agricultural techniques. He actually had served under President Grover as the Secretary of Agriculture. The first Arbor Day was on April 10, 1872. In 1970, President Nixon proclaimed the last Friday of April as National Arbor Day. Arbor Day is now celebrated in other countries including Australia, although many go by different names such as: 'Greening Week' in Japan, 'The

New Year's Days of Trees' in Israel, 'The Tree-loving Week' in Korea, 'The Reforestation Week' in Yugoslavia, 'The Students' Afforestation Day' in Iceland and 'The National Festival of Tree Planting' in India (http://arbor-day.net/index.htm).

SPRINGTIME ANNOUNCEMENT




As springtime approaches, we like to notify residents that they may start seeing Friendly Village staff walking around on their lots, behind their homes etc. doing our annual lot inspections. We are looking for excess items piled

up behind sheds, auto parts/tires laying around, trash/ recyling bags piled up, general debris that does not belong on lots that need to be cleaned up.

Notifications will start going out once those inspections are done to remind residents of what we want taken care of with their lot, home, shed or deck area. We usually give residents a month to get your lots picked up and

cleared of debris in our springtime inspections. This is the time of year to also take a look at your siding and see if it needs to be power washed or you can scrub it yourself to get the unsight-




ALL PINEGROVE HOMES ARE **ENERGY STAR EFFICIENT**

Earth Day is April 22, 2024. What are you willing to do in order to Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle? Here is a list of several earth friendly alternatives for everyday household products and their uses:



- Baking Soda cleans, deodorizes, softens water, scours.
- Soap unscented soap in liquid form, flakes, powders or bars is biodegradable and will clean just about anything. Avoid using soaps which contain petroleum distillates.
- Lemon one of the strongest food-acids, effective against most household bacteria.
- Borax (sodium borate) cleans, deodorizes, disinfects, softens water, cleans wallpaper, painted walls and floors.
- White Vinegar cuts grease, removes mildew, odors, some stains and wax build-up.
- Washing Soda or SAL Soda is sodium carbonate decahydrate, a mineral. Washing soda cuts grease, removes stains, softens water, cleans wall, tiles, sinks and tubs. Use care, as washing soda can irritate mucous membranes. Do not use on aluminum.
- Isopropyl Alcohol is an excellent disinfectant. (It has been suggested to replace this with ethanol or 100 proof alcohol in solution with water. There is some indication that isopropyl alcohol buildup contributes to illness in the body. See http://drclark.ch/g)
- Cornstarch can be used to clean windows, polish furniture, shampoo carpets and rugs.
- Citrus Solvent cleans paint brushes, oil and grease, some stains. (Citrus solvent may cause skin, lung or eye irritations for people with multiple chemical sensitivities.)



Seedlings: Lettuce, onions, some perennial herbs (chives, parsley, oregano, thyme, sage, rosemary, etc.). Make sure to cover if the forecast calls for frost.

From Seed: Peas, turnip, beets, carrots, lettuce and other greens, onion sets, parsnips, radishes, broccoli and other members of the cabbage family.
